How are you feeling at the beginning of this new year?

The end of 2025 saw a number of our church family facing illnesses of different kinds. If we needed a reminder that we need to be looking out for and, just as importantly, praying for each other then this is it.

The greeting is 'happy' new year, but we need to understand that happiness can feel a long way off for each of us at different times.

We are about to start a new series in our Wednesday night Bible Fellowship group looking at some of the psalms.

I don't know how you feel about the psalms. I learned many of them as a child chorister, but really grew to love them whilst I was at theological college.

I think that it's reasonably fair to say that the psalms are a mixture of genre. There are those where we can sing out praise to God (for example Psalm 145); lament psalms where we can complain or grieve (psalm 22); thanksgiving psalms (psalm 124); those that express loyalty to God (psalm 2); those of trusting in God (psalm 23) and those of wisdom (psalm 1). There are also those that remind us that God knows us so very intimately (psalm 139).

I really want to encourage you to read the psalms at the beginning of this new year or try coming along on Wednesday evenings.

There is something in the psalms for each of us, inspiring, lamenting, praising. They are very real and regularly explore the lives of the writers, including David, and what they are going through, both good and bad.
